


Example of a doodle crafted in real time as the full panel was presented.




Example of a doodle crafted while listening to a computer-generated voice reading a paper submitted via email.








































The final panel on the final day of the conference. Note that panel 24 doesn't exist; its speakers were slotted into other panels at the last minute.
